From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends in Christ:

This weekend's Gospel offers a sobering and timely reminder from Jesus about where we place our security. A man interrupts Jesus, asking Him to settle a family dispute over inheritance. Jesus doesn't take the bait—instead, He tells a parable about a wealthy man who fills his barns to the brim, makes grand plans to enjoy his comfort, and then suddenly dies that night. God's words to him are chilling: "You fool, this night your life will be demanded of you..."

This is not a condemnation of wealth or hard work. Jesus is not saying it's wrong to build up a retirement plan or to prepare for the future. The issue is that this man never thought beyond himself. His entire focus was my crops, my barns, my grain, my goods, my comfort, my



soul. He didn't think of anyone else—not family, not neighbor, not God. His wealth was full, but his heart was empty.

The Psalm response this weekend reminds us: "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts." The rich man in the parable failed to hear God's voice—not because God wasn't speaking, but because his heart was closed. Hardened by self-centeredness and self-sufficiency, he could no longer hear the call to generosity, compassion, and trust. And when the voice of God finally broke through, it was too late.

This parable challenges us to look at the priorities that shape our daily living. Are we rich in what matters to God? Are we storing up treasure in heaven by the way we live on earth? Are we using what we have to bless others, or just to build bigger barns?

The truth is, none of us knows the day or hour. What we do know is this: if we live each day with generosity, humility, and gratitude, we will be storing up the kind of treasure that can never be lost.

This week, I invite each of us to ask:

- What am I storing up?
- What am I investing my energy in—just earthly comfort, or eternal value?
- Is there someone I can bless this week by sharing my time, my treasure, or my presence?

Let's not just live full lives—let's live *rich* lives: rich in faith, love, compassion, and trust in God. And may we never harden our hearts to the voice of the Lord calling us to what matters most.

Speaking of blessing someone...a HUGE thank you for your amazing support of our Youth Ministry's STUFF THE VAN. Over the past couple of weeks, I asked us to respond with hearts wide open—to show our youth that when we serve others in Christ's name, we are doing something sacred. Well, you did exactly that.



I want to offer a heartfelt thank you for the tremendous support of our STUFF THE VAN campaign. What an amazing sight it was to see the parish van overflowing with donations after just two Masses—literally *stuffed* to the roof with kindness, generosity, and care for our neighbors—it was so full I went to the Food Pantry and got

their cargo van and our youth moved the donations into that van and then that was stuffed by the end of our morning Masses. What tremendous concern you have for our



neighbors in need; it is truly heart-warming.

You heard the need: families right here in our area—many with school-aged children—facing empty shelves and hungry bellies during the summer months. And you responded as the Body of Christ: with compassion, with generosity, and with action. From cereal and snack packs to jars of peanut butter and canned goods, every item you brought helped to fill more than just shelves; it lifted hearts and nourished dignity.



Our youth ministry group, who led the effort with such heart and enthusiasm, were overwhelmed—in the best way—by your response. Not only did you help restock the pantry during a critical season, but you also gave our young people a powerful witness of what it means to live the Gospel.

Jesus said, "I was hungry, and you gave me food" (Matthew 25:35). Last weekend, we saw those words come to life in our parish. Thank you for your generosity. Thank you for your witness. And thank you for helping us not just STUFF THE VAN—but fill it with love.

Order of Christian Initiation of Adults...We call it O.C.I.A., or what used to be known as R.C.I.A., and it stands for the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults.



It's more than a program. It's more than a class. It's a journey of faith that helps people—who may have been away from the Church, or never been a part of it—come to know Jesus Christ and to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church.

At its heart, O.C.I.A. is a **process of conversion and formation**. It's for those who are seeking God, longing for truth, or simply feeling something stir in their hearts. It's not about having all the answers—it's about being open to the questions that really matter: Who am I? What is my purpose? Is God real? Can I come to know Him?

What makes O.C.I.A. so beautiful is that it isn't just about learning doctrine (though that's important!). It's about immersion into a Christ-centered way of living. Through Scripture, prayer, sharing life experiences, the sacraments, and the companionship of fellow seekers and sponsors, those in O.C.I.A. begin to see that the Catholic faith is not just a set of teachings—it's a way of life. A life rooted in the love of Jesus, in service to others, and in the deep, abiding joy of being part of the Church He founded.

Who Can Join the O.C.I.A.?

- Any unbaptized adult who desires to learn more about the Catholic faith with the possibility of being baptized and received into the Church.
- Baptized Christians from other denominations who wish to explore what it means to be in full communion with the Catholic Church.
- Catholics who were baptized,

but have not received their First Holy Communion or the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Maybe that's you. Maybe that's someone you know. A friend, a neighbor, a spouse, a coworker. So often people are quietly searching, just waiting for an invitation. One of the most powerful tools of evangelization is simply the words, "Would you like to come with me?" Your invitation might be the very thing God uses to lead someone home.

Last year, we were blessed with several individuals who responded to that call. They came with curiosity, with questions, with hope. And by Easter, they came with faith, joy, and a new sense of belonging. Their journey was deeply moving—not only for them, but for our entire parish family.

It's important to say: entering the O.C.I.A. does not mean you're making a commitment on day one. It's a process of discernment. It's a time of honest seeking. There is no pressure, no obligation—just a warm, open space to explore what the Catholic Church teaches, believes, and lives.

If you or someone you know has felt that gentle nudge—perhaps a stirring in your heart to go deeper in faith—we encourage you to take the next step. You don't have to do it alone. We want to walk this journey with you.



Recent studies suggest that millennials will be the first generation in America to be worse off than their parents in terms of financial earnings and job status. Many lament this. I propose that this week's Gospel provides a hopeful way to see the trend as good news.

The Lord Jesus says, "Take care to guard against greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist in possessions" (Luke 12:15). Greed damages us with the deception that we are what we possess. But to Jesus, this is simply not true. What makes us happy is who we are, who we become.

Does not the expectation that every generation should do better than their parents subtly mask the poison of greed? A similar attitude is mirrored in the man who demands that Jesus justly arrange his share of the family inheritance. Despite the injustice, Jesus will not play that game. In fact, he seems to prefer that the man have less than his parents. What good would having more be to this man if he

becomes enslaved and miserable by greed? What good would it be for us to have more if it means we become much less?

In allowing the man to have less, Jesus opens a space for him to become more: a man free to love. In that much more meaningful sense, perhaps he was better off than his parents. Maybe the millennials will be, too.







Hello and welcome back to Yakety Yak with Father Yates, this is the column where I attempt to answer your questions about our Catholic faith. I do really enjoy attempting to answer your questions, so please keep them coming in. This week I received the follow question, "Father, the bible says to call no man father, so why do we call you father?"

Yes it is true that Matthew 23:9 says, "And call no man your father on earth, for you have one Father, who is in Heaven." Notice, however, that this makes no distinction between spiritual fathers, which is what our priests are to us, and biological fathers. In other words, if you interpret this passage to say, absolutely, that no man is to be called father, you cannot distinguish between calling a priest 'father' and calling the man who is married to your mother

'father'. But, is that actually what this passage is saying? Or is Jesus warning us against trying to usurp the fatherhood of God? The latter intention, in many ways, is what the Pharisees and Scribes were doing. They wanted all attention focused on them . . . they were leaving God, the Father, out of the equation, which is why Jesus goes on to call them hypocrites, liars, and whitewashed tombs.

If you interpret this passage from Matthew 23 as an absolute ban against calling anyone your spiritual father, then there are some problems for you in the rest of Scripture. For example, Jesus, in the story of Lazarus and the rich man in Luke 16, has the rich man referring to Abraham as 'father' several times. Paul, in Romans chapter 4, refers to Abraham as the 'father' of the uncircumcised, the Gentiles. That's referring to spiritual fatherhood, not biological fatherhood.

In Acts 7:1-2, the first Christian martyr, Stephen, referred to the Jewish authorities and elders who were about to stone him as brothers and 'fathers', as does Paul in Acts, chapter 22. This is referring to spiritual fatherhood. So, if you interpret Matthew 23 as saying we cannot call anyone our spiritual father, then you would have to argue that Jesus, Paul, Stephen, and the Holy Spirit must have all gotten it wrong.

It is okay to call priests 'father', just as it was okay for Jesus and Paul to call Abraham 'father' and for Stephen and Paul to call the Jewish elders 'father'. As long as we remember that our true Father is God the Father and that all aspects of fatherhood, biological and spiritual, are derived from Him, and as long as we do not allow anyone else to usurp that role in any way, shape, or form, as the Pharisees and Scribes were prone to do.



God and Country - Part V

"But Peter and the apostles answered, 'We must obey God rather than men.'" -Acts 5:29

As we conclude this series on God and Country, remember that we are first and foremost God's servants. Pope Leo XIII instructed that the essential duty of Christians is "to love both countries, that of the earth below and that of heaven above, yet in such mode that the love of our heavenly surpass the love of our earthly home." Pope St. John Paul II warned us to remember "the essential difference between an unhealthy form of nationalism, which teaches contempt for other nations and cultures, and patriotism, which is proper love of one's country." Our love of country must be grounded in the universal moral law and the common good.

Oppression by civil authorities can occur in the context of labor, economic, social and political circumstances. Note that it is not the role of the pastor to intervene in the political structure and the organization of social life; rather, it is inherent in the vocation of lay persons, acting on their own initiative with their fellow citizens, to further the common good through social action in conformity with the Gospel message. Citizens are not obliged to follow the directives of civil authorities when they are morally wrong, violate fundamental rights of persons or directly contradict the Gospel message. Citizens are called to action to change any form of oppression using means permissible under the civil law and, failing those, other forms of civil disobedience appropriate under the circumstances.

- Labor: When faced with oppressive working conditions, it is morally acceptable for workers to strike, provided it is necessary to obtain an appropriate wage or benefit and it is not used to pursue objectives that are not directly linked to working conditions and the common good. Violence is always morally unacceptable in this context.
- **Economic:** When a group is faced with dire economic circumstances resulting from famine, natural disasters, war or economic exploitation, the community should provide direct aid to those suffering to address their immediate basic human needs. Beyond that, the community, whether local, national or international, should also avidly pursue reforms, practices and institutional changes to address the causes that led to the dire economic circumstances or oppression.
- Social: Citizens must oppose and seek reforms to social policies that do not promote the common good, respect human dignity or undermine the fundamental freedom to practice one's faith. Citizens may pursue these changes through the political process, judicial action, peaceful marches, media campaigns and other forms of appropriate nonviolent activities. Violence is always morally unacceptable in this context.
- Political: Political change is best handled through the political process. However, citizens are obliged in conscience not to follow directives of the political authorities that are contrary to the moral order, the fundamental rights of persons or the Gospel message. Citizens should do what is objectively demanded by the common good and legitimate to defend their rights and those of their fellow citizens, provided doing so is consistent with the Gospel and natural law. Armed resistance to political oppression is not legitimate unless the following conditions exist:
 - 1. There are certain, grave and prolonged violations of fundamental rights;
 - 2. All other means of redress have been exhausted;
 - 3. Such resistance will not provoke worse disorders;
 - 4. There is a well-founded hope of success; and
 - 5. It is reasonably impossible to foresee any better solution.

God intends us to live as an earthly community to prepare for the heavenly community. This requires that we love one another as Jesus loved us in accordance with the Ten Commandments. God's desire for order requires community leaders who we obey and support. Our leaders should pursue the common good in accordance with the morals and beliefs of the community. As citizens, we must do our part to work peacefully within our community to ensure our labor, economic, social and political leaders adopt policies and practices that ensure this, thereby setting the example for others to follow.

Several hundred Italian-Americans marched in a procession three blocks long in honor of St. Trofimena, a fourth century virgin martyr, whose statue was held aloft on a platform and carried through New Haven's Wooster Street neighborhood of Little Italy.

The procession, held on the saint's feast day, July 13, was sponsored by the St. Trofimena Society and was preceded by a Mass at St. Michael Church.

It included a marching band, a Knights of Columbus honor guard and representatives from the St. Catello Society and other Italian-American organizations from St. Michael and St. Anthony churches, which are part of the Blessed Michael McGivney Parish in the Elm

David Kelley, one of the organizers, said it was the first time in 40 years there has been a procession for the saint, who is patron of Minori, Italy, and the first time in 70 years for the St. Catello Society.

Kelley, who is co-president of the St. Trofimena Society with his cousin, Richard Biondi, says, "This is beyond belief. This is more than we ever anticipated or dreamed of doing." Only two years ago, the co-presidents revived the society, which was founded in 1908. It now boasts some 120 members.

"The Mass and procession mean a great deal to me and the members of the societies," Biondi says.

"For the older members to celebrate a Mass in Italian brings back cherished memories of their youth and family members who are no longer alive."

Biondi adds that the procession was also an opportunity for unity among the Italian-American religious organizations in the New Haven area and "an occasion to celebrate our Catholic faith, as well as our Italian-American culture and traditions." The procession included delegations from societies that honor St. Trofimena, St. Catello, St. Anthony, St. Andrew, St. Anne and St. Maria Maddalena.

Father Joseph MacNeill led the procession and celebrated Mass in Italian earlier that morning. The priest, who is chaplain of St. Thomas More Chapel & Center at Yale in New Haven, traces his ancestry on his mother's side to the Abruzzi region of Italy.

"I'm here to continue to give witness to our passion, faith, culture and saints for the next generation of Italian Americans," he says. Founded in 1901, members of the St. Catello Society carried a statue of the ninth century bishop of Castellamare di Stabia, a city southeast of Naples.

Gene Avino, whose grandfather began the society to help immigrants from his home, says the group will celebrate its 125th anniversary next year.

The president, Paul Criscuolo, says there has been a renewed interest in Italian heritage and that 14 new members have enrolled, some of them from Ireland, Italy, California and Florida. Around the turn of the century, immigrants established Italian societies at St. Michael's, the oldest Italian church in Connecticut, to offer assistance to one another, honor their traditions and share their devotion to the patron saints of their hometowns.

According to tradition, St. Trofimena was a young woman who was killed by her father for refusing to marry a pagan because she was Christian.

Kelley said the day was a testament to the enduring presence of Italian-American culture and faith.

"I grew up at St. Michael's Church as a child and spent a lot of time with my grandparents," he recalled. "I love our Italian traditions, so we hope this is a kind of revival."
